What is **Fentanyl?**

Fentanyl is an FDA approved synthetic opioid or painkiller prescribed by doctors to patients with extreme pain, such as cancer. It is mostly administered intravenously or via a patch.

It is 100 times more potent than heroin or morphine and a highly addictive drug.

Recently, illegal manufacturing of fentanyl has led to "FentaPills" or "FakePills", which are unknowingly sold as Oxycontin, Percocet, Vicodin, Xanax, Adderall, or laced into street drugs such as Ecstasy (MDNA), Cocaine, and many others.

A Fenta or FakePill has a 40% chance of death.


In 2023, this number will likely surpass 100,000, or 275/day

Fentanyl is now the leading cause of death among ages 18 to 45 in the U.S.

The only way to reverse this trend is by educating our youth, before they turn 18.



Criminal drug networks are flooding the U.S. with deadly fake pills

- Criminal drug networks are mass-producing fake pills and falsely marketing them as legitimate prescription pills to deceive the American public.
- Fake pills pills are easy to purchase, widely available, often contain fentanyl or methamphetamine, and can be deadly.
- Fake prescription pills are easily accessible and often sold on social media and e-commerce platforms, making them available to anyone with a smartphone, including minors.
- Many fake pills are made to look like prescription opioids such as oxycodone (Oxycontin[®], Percocet[®]), hydrocodone (Vicodin[®]), and alprazolam (Xanax[®]); or stimulants like amphetamines (Adderall[®]).

Fake pills are widely available across every state in the Country.

- DEA and its law enforcement partners are seizing deadly fake pills at record rates.
- Fake pills have been seized in all 50 states and the District of Columbia.
- Drug trafficking is also inextricably linked with violence.

In 2022, DEA seized more than 50.6 million


LETHAL DOSE

Fake pills often contain fentanyl and are more lethal than ever before.


DEA officials report a dramatic rise in the number of fake pills containing at least 2 mg of fentanyl, which is considered a deadly dose. Drug traffickers are using fake pills to exploit the opioid crisis and prescription drug misuse. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports more than 100,000 drug overdose deaths in the United States in the most recent 12-month reporting period, the most ever recorded. Fentanyl, the synthetic opioid most commonly found in fake pills, is the primary driver in this alarming increase in overdose deaths.

1960: Fentanyl is first synthesized by Dr. Paul Janssen, a Belgian chemist. It is 100 times more powerful than morphine and was the most potent opioid or pain-killer in the world.


1960s – 1980s: In 1963, fentanyl was introduced in Europe and began being used as an intravenous painkiller. It wasn't until 1972, when the FDA approved fentanyl for use on its own in the U.S.; because there were concerns about its potency and the likelihood of misuse.



1981: fentanyl went off patent and sales increased 10-fold, which led to its wide use in cardiac and vascular surgery.




1990s: New drug deliveries are approved including a patch, lollipop, lozenge, tablet, spray, and film. The patch earned its place on the World Health Organization's List of Essential Medicines and is widely used for patients with chronic pain who have became tolerant to other opiates.




Early 2000s: The FDA began an investigation into Duragesic (patch) as there were a spate of deaths and overdoses. A Public Health Advisory was released in 2007, stating some doctors were inappropriately prescribing the patch and some patients were incorrectly using it.

Meanwhile, it was found the lollipop was being prescribed off-label and more than 80% of patients didn't have cancer, it's primary condition to help.


At the same time, the DEA began to identify illicit recreation use and had it's first seizure of illicit production at a lab in Mexico. There were 1,000 deaths associated with illegally manufactured non-pharmaceutical fentanyl.



2008 – 2016: After the raid on the Mexican lab, things were quiet until 2013, when street use began to climb, primarily in the North-Eastern states. It wasn't long before it starting showing up more in the South, the Midwest, and then ultimately all North America.



2017 – Today: In March of 2022, the UN Commission on Narcotic Drugs (CND) listed three precursor chemicals for fentanyl to be on in the international controlled substance list, making them illegal to traffic.



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2017 – Today: In March of 2022, the UN Commission on Narcotic Drugs (CND) listed three precursor chemicals for fentanyl to be on in the international controlled substance list, making them illegal to traffic:

- 4-anilinopiperidine (4-AP)
- 1-(tert-butoxycarbonyl)-4-phenylaminopiperidine (boc-4-AP)
- N-phenyl-N-(piperidin-4-yl) propionamide (norfentanyl)

With more illicit fentanyl labs than ever, primarily in Mexico and China, the production has grown to unprecedented levels, making it very inexpensive and more easily accessible than ever to make its way to street drugs.

Overdose or Murder?

Individual state legislatures are rapidly passing laws that define selling fentanyl that leads to a fatal overdose; a form of first-degree murder.

And U.S. Congress has introduced a similar bill (S.380) that would solidify it as federal law; which includes the death penalty.

New legislation from Sen. Marco Rubio (R-Fla.) would make selling fentanyl used in a fatal overdose a federal crime punishable by the death penalty. Rubio's bill is <u>backed by</u> a dozen other Republican senators, including Marsha Blackburn (Tenn.), Tom Cotton (Ark.), Ted Cruz (Texas), Joni Ernst (Iowa), and Josh Hawley (Mo.).

The <u>bill</u> (S.4876) would define selling fentanyl that leads to a fatal overdose as a form of first-degree murder under federal law. A <u>first-degree murder</u> conviction means life in prison at minimum, and possibly the death penalty.

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

Boy texts back with instructions. Boy unknowingly bought a FentaPill, girl takes ½ the pill and dies. Boy gets charged with murder.







Fentanyl: Testing Does Not Work

Fentanyl is only a microscopic portion of the pill, so to be accurate, you would need to crush and test the entire pill.

Fentanyl: Three Key Takeaways

1) Don't ever take a prescription pill unless it is prescribed by your doctor.

2) Do not pass pills or sell pills as you could be found guilty of murder if it's a Fenta or FakePill.

3) Report anyone passing or selling pills to someone you trust.

You might just save two lives.
